

Next week, residents of Oregon and Washington, D.C. will vote on three ballot initiatives relating to the decriminalization of psychedelics. In the run-up to the election, *Bill of Health* is hosting a <u>digital symposium that looks at psychedelics decriminalization from a variety of angles</u>. The symposium is guest edited by <u>Mason Marks</u>, Fellow in Ethics of Technological and Biomedical Innovation at the Edmond J. Safra and Petrie-Flom Centers.

Our roster of November events also kicks off next week. On November 6th, we'll host "Nudging Organ Donation," a discussion of strategies to bridge the gap between supply and demand for organ transplantation, with a keynote presentation by Professor Cass Sunstein. 
